2. CRG Correspondence, Questions and Actions Register	 CRG correspondence and questions received: Question from last meeting – How does NQBP make and distribute profits? Response – NQBP generates its revenue predominantly from vessel income, port usage income and rental income. We distribute these profits in a few ways including: 100% of our dividends to the State Government via our Shareholding Ministers (Transport and Treasury). Our 2018/19 dividend was \$9.9M. Through donations and sponsorships. Through other investments like employment, community assets etc. Actions register update: Most of the actions from the last meeting have been completed. December 2019 was a great month for the Port of Mackay Highest December trade figure in 10 years, 304,539 tonnes First batch of chickpeas to Bangladesh Biggest month for break bulk cargo since the mining downturn Coal haulage fleet of 66 wagons in January with a further 198 to go. Question – Is there a competitive advantage to bring wagons through Mackay? Response – Yes. The wagons would have usually come through Brisbane or Townsville and then be trucked to Paget for commissioning (wagons can't go on rail until they are officially commissioned). Being shipped to Mackay reduces the distance they need to travel via road to Paget. Question – Where were the wagons built? Response – They were built in Wuhan. NQBP have been following all directions from relevant authorities, including lead agency Australian Department of Health, Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ), and Borderforce. MSQ has put in place procedures in place for ships visiting Australia from China so that issues are addressed before the ships arrive. These procedures continued to be updated with latest advice. Currently there haven't been any disruptions to shipping.

	Gudyara Road update Gudyara Road construction is nearing completion. Remaining items left to be completed includes line-marking, commissioning of street lights and some minor works. Question – What is the maintenance plan for Slade Point Road? Response – Within the construction contract there is a defect liability period of 12 months where the contractors will need to undertake any repairs. After 12 months, Slade Point Road will then fall under DTMR's standard road maintenance program. The recent undercutting during heavy weather occurred because the base was not yet stabilised. Once vegetation grows along Slade Point Road this should stabilise. The 12-month defect liability period starts from the date that NQBP signs off the project as complete. Question – Will there be an official opening ceremony? Response – No, the naming ceremony served as the opening ceremony. The community will be advised as soon as they can use the road. Coronavirus All foreign trading ships scheduled to arrive at Queensland ports are required to report if any crew member or passenger: has visited Hubei Province, China within the past 14 days has visited mainland China since 1 February 2020 is showing any of the Novel Coronavirus symptoms. Ships must provide this information to VTS 2–3 hours before embarking a Pilot and/or going to anchor, and with the Reef VTS Pre-Entry report (1 hour prior to entering the Reef VTS area). Any crew member identified as having visited Hubei Province, China within the past 14 days OR having visited mainland China since 1 February will be asked report to the Captain and to self-isolate on board the vessel for the period of their stay in the Australian port or for a period that spans 14 days since leaving the province or mainland China (whichever is shortest). Such crew members are not to have personal interaction with Australian based maritime industry staff. MSQ will make the appropriate notifications to State health authorities for further advice if any crew reports as falling in these categories.
